## AMERICAL DIVISION NEWS

CHU LAI (AMERICAL TO)—Ten VC killed and three individual wearons captured, was the result of scattered contacts in the Americal Division's southern I Corps Tactical Zone yesterday.

\* \* \* \*

"Jungle Warriors" of the 11th Inf. Bde. reported nine VC killed and one VC suspect detained yesterday.

"Shark" gunships of the 174th Avn. Co. destroyed six structures and killed five VC in response to sniper fire, 15 miles north of Duc Pho.

The "Shrks" also combined with troops of the 4th Bn., 3d Inf. to kill one VC c: a hillside, two miles east of Duc Pho.

Troops of a 3d Bn., 1st Inf. company killed one VC without an ID card near a village four miles north of Duc Pho.

"E" Trp., lst Cav. combined with infantrymen of the lst Bn., 20th Inf. to kill one WC near huts nine miles northwest of Quang Ngai City.

The helicopter of the Bde's. S-2 Air, accounted for one VC killed near the Tra Khuc River, 14 miles west of Quang Ngai City.

Yesterday afternoon soldiers of a 4th Bn., 3d Inf. company detained a VC tax collector near a clearing, six miles south of Duc Fho.

In the 196th Inf. Bde's, area of operations, "Charger" units found one dead VC and three individual weapons yesterday.

Troops of a 4th Bn., 21st Inf. company found the VC body seven miles southwest of Hoi An. He had been killed by small area fire.

Action was light in the 198th Inf. Bde's. area of operations yesterday.

A 5th Bn., 46th Inf. commany led by CPT George L. Harmon (Dothan, Alc.) working with a combined action patrol discovered two mine fields south of Chu Lai yesterday.

The "Professionals" had unexpectedly come upon the mine field during a sweep of the area. They coordinated their efforts with a company from the 26th Engrs, who sup-lied a mine detector, and the Division EOD team and systematically destroyed the mines.

A short time later they discovered and destroyed a second rune field. In all, the teams destroyed 93 mines and one booby trapped 105mm howitzer round.

In the Burlington Trail area a lsv Bn., 52d Inf. company led by LLT Michael J. Deal (Arlington, Va.) discovered one protective rask, 20 82mm charges, and one bag of fuses while searching an abandoned hut west of Tam Ky.

Further to the west a lst Bn., 46th Inf. company led by CPT Roger Dimsdale (Washington, D.C.) found charred remains of enemy equipment that been burned as a result of air strikes.

OLYMPIC SFORTS

MEXICO CITY (UFI)—Boxing as conducted in the Olympic Games must be radically revised to protect it from charges that it is a brutal sport and to stimulate greater interest throughout the world, according to a boxing official of Thailand.

Chaloke Komarakul, president of Thai Amateur Boxing Association and a patron of the Asia Amateur Boxing Federation, said Wednesday that pre-olympic regional qualification tournaments should be held for boxers the same as for football teams.

Under such a system, only 16 boxers will come to the Olympic Games for each of the 11 classes, Komarakul said. That would mean there would be a maximum of 176 boxers whereas there are now from 300 to 400 boxers in the Olympic Games. In would mean fer fewer bouts.

In order to become a champion under the present system, Komarakul said, a boxer has to fight six or seven times within 13 days. It means he will have to fight the champion of another country once every two days.

Kommrakul said his proposal has been accepted in principle by the executive committee of the International amteur Boxing Federation subject to approval of the federation's congress.

Komarakul said his proposal could go a long way toward eliminating bad decisions.

"Dad decisions are caused by bias, nationalism and over-working of the of-ficials," he said. "Whith a marked reduction of bouts under my proposal, the officials would not be overworked and be in a position to render fair decisions."

"Only the real champions would be competing, calling for real techinque, and there should be no grounds for calling boxing a brutal eport;" . Komarakulsaid.
